Short title

Proclamation which repeals the Proclamation made under the Criminal Law (Criminal Organisations Disruption) and Other Legislation Amendment Act 2013 on 12 June 2014

Authorising law

Section 2 of the Criminal Law (Criminal Organisations Disruption) and Other Legislation Amendment Act 2013 (the Act).

Policy objectives and the reasons for them

The objective of the Proclamation is to repeal the Proclamation made under the Act on 12 June 2014 (SL No. 90 of 2014).

The Act was passed on 21 November 2013 and provided that some parts commenced on proclamation. A Proclamation was made on 12 June 2014 to set the commencement date for parts 8, 14 and 24 of the Act as 1 July 2015. Subsequent to the Proclamation being made, it became necessary to defer the commencement of the provisions for a further 12 months.

On 3 June 2015, the *Payroll Tax Rebate, Revenue and Other Legislation Amendment Bill 2015* was passed which amends the commencement date in the Act for parts 8, 14 and 24 of the Act and provides that the provisions in these parts commence on 1 July 2016. The commencement proclamation no longer has legal effect and will be repealed.

Achievement of policy objectives

The policy objectives are achieved by repealing the Proclamation in force.

Consistency with policy objectives of authorising law

The Proclamation is consistent with the objectives of the Act.

Inconsistency with policy objectives of other legislation

The Proclamation is not inconsistent with the policy objectives of other legislation.

Benefits and costs of implementation

The Proclamation will repeal a Proclamation. There are no costs.

Consistency with fundamental legislative principles

The Proclamation is consistent with fundamental legislative principles.

Consultation

Government departments responsible for administering the provisions affected have been consulted and support the repeal of the Proclamation.
