The Legal Affairs and Community Safety Committee recommends that the Legislative Assembly note the contents of this report.

1. Introduction

1.1 Role of the committee

The Legal Affairs and Community Safety Committee is a portfolio committee of the Legislative Assembly which commenced on 27 March 2015 under the *Parliament of Queensland Act 2001* (PoQA) and the Standing Rules and Orders of the Legislative Assembly.²

The committee's primary areas of responsibility include:

- Justice and Attorney-General
- Police Service
- Fire and Emergency Services, and
- Training and Skills.

A portfolio committee is to consider legislation, public works and public accounts matters pertaining to its areas of responsibility, and to deal with any matters referred to it by the Legislative Assembly.³ The committee may deal with the matter under section 94(1) of the PoQA by considering the matter, reporting on the matter and making recommendations about it to the House.

Reports of the Auditor-General tabled in the Assembly are referred to the relevant portfolio committee for consideration.⁴

1.2 Role of the Auditor-General

The Auditor-General is an independent statutory officer appointed by the Governor in Council under the *Auditor-General Act 2009*. The Auditor-General is supported by the Queensland Audit Office.⁵

The Auditor-General undertakes both financial audits and performance audits of public sector entities. Financial audits provide an opinion on the financial statements of public sector entities. Performance audits encompass broader objectives, including evaluating whether an entity, program or initiative has achieved its objectives in an economical and efficient manner. The Auditor-General must report to the Legislative Assembly on each audit conducted of a public sector entity.

1.3 Referral

Standing Orders require that the Committee of the Legislative Assembly refer an Auditor-General report to the relevant portfolio committee as soon as practicable after it has been tabled.⁸

The Auditor-General reports considered in this report are listed in the table below, including the dates they were referred to the committee for consideration.
