


# **CROSS RIVER RAIL** for Brisbane

Cross River Rail is the Queensland Government's highest priority infrastructure project and an important part of our vision to cater for future growth, unlock economic opportunities and make Queensland and Brisbane more internationally competitive.

This second rail river crossing will ease congestion, improve network reliability and increase accessibility to the Brisbane CBD, allowing more people to travel longer distances, with shorter journey times right across the network.

The Queensland Budget 2016-17 allocates \$50 million towards early stage planning and approvals for Cross River Rail including environmental impact approvals, establishment of the statutory body, commencement of scoping of value share opportunities, commencement of early works and commencement of pre-procurement activities.

Cross River Rail is the natural and necessary next step of our transport network and will be a catalyst for urban revitalisation in Australia's New World City.

#### Regional Action Plan

The Brisbane region stretches from the South D'Aguilar national park in the west to Moreton Bay to the east, with a world-class river city at its heart. As the State's most populous region, Brisbane has a dynamic and diverse economy, with a rapidly expanding pool of expertise in many knowledge-based service sectors, helping drive economic growth now and into the future. We know we have more work to do to foster this ongoing growth through the provision of innovative economic and transport infrastructure to ensure Brisbane remains well placed to take advantage of opportunities as they develop. 



cruise tourism opportunity for South East Queensland. A \$100 million facility for mega cruise ships that could add as much as \$1 billion in gross output annually to the Queensland economy by 2036 has been proposed by the Port of Brisbane and approved by the Queensland Government for detailed consideration under the Government's streamlined Market-Led Proposal framework. It is estimated that the project, if approved, would create 300 jobs during construction. Should the detailed proposal meet Government criteria, the Port of Brisbane will enter into a binding contract with Government to deliver the project with a view to commencing construction in early 2017 and delivering an operational facility in 2019.



Bulimba State School

\$5.7 million in 2016-17 out of a \$6.9 million total spend to continue construction of additional classrooms and a resource centre.

2 Calamvale Special School

\$4.2 million in 2016-17 out of a \$4.9 million total spend to continue construction of additional classrooms and staff accommodation.

3 Capalaba State College

\$1.8 million in 2016-17 out of a \$2.1 million total spend to construct a new Early Years Service at Capalaba State College to service the Redland Bay area.

4 Coorparoo Creek Park flood mitigation

\$1.3 million in 2016-17 out of a \$9.9 million total spend to redevelop the Coorparoo Precinct as part of the Eastern Corridor Neighbourhood Plan. This initiative is in partnership with the Brisbane City Council.

Cross River Rail

\$50 million in 2016-17 to establish the delivery authority, progress planning and environmental approvals and commence readiness for market activities and early and enabling works.

6 Elderly Parent Carer Innovation Initiative

\$2.7 million in 2016-17 out of a \$4.5 million total spend to continue the initiative with projects in: Albany Creek, Alexandra Hills, Enoggera, Taigum and Bracken Ridge. This initiative aims to provide greater security for older parent carers who can no longer look after their adult son or daughter with a disability.

7 Enoggera State School new performing arts facility

\$2.7 million in 2016-17 to construct the new performing arts facility.

8 Gateway Motorway North, Boondall, Southern Cross Way and Boundary Road planning upgrade

> \$300,000 in 2016-17 to undertake planning for the Gateway Motorway North between Southern Cross Way and Boundary Road, due for completion in June 2018.

9 Gateway Motorway North upgrade

> \$250 million in 2016-17 out of a \$1.143 billion total spend on widening the motorway to six lanes between Nudgee and Bracken Ridge, due for completion in January 2019. This project is being undertaken in partnership with the Australian Government.



10 Brisbane Inner North Sporting Community Inc.

\$500,000 in 2016-17 to commence the construction of a multipurpose clubhouse and develop a junior Australian football oval to support multi-sport at Stafford.

11 Phoenix Northside Netball Club Inc.

\$50,000 in 2016-17 out of a \$100,000 total spend to complete the construction of two courts to support netball at Ferny Grove. 12 Belmont Shooting Centre

\$14.8 million in 2016-17 out of a \$16.5 million total spend for upgrades to provide the shooting venue and improved facilities as a legacy benefit for the sport.

13 Integrated Resort
Development – Queens
Wharf Brisbane

\$1.3 million in 2016-17 out of a \$20.5 million total spend to facilitate the construction and delivery of the project that invigorates the entire precinct and delivers striking landmark architecture.

14 Ipswich Motorway, Rocklea to Darra (Stage 1) upgrade


\$25.4 million in 2016-17 out of a \$400 million total spend to upgrade the motorway between Oxley Road and Suscatand Street, due for completion in June 2019. The upgrade is partially funded through the State Infrastructure Fund Priority Economic Works and Productivity Program. This project is being undertaken in partnership with the Australian Government.

15 Ironside State School

\$5.8 million in 2016-17 out of a \$6.9 million total spend to continue construction of additional classrooms and replace existing structures.

16 Intersection Upgrade Business Case

> \$500,000 in 2016-17 to complete the business case and consultation for the intersection upgrade at Kessels Road/Logan Road/ Mount Gravatt - Capalaba Road, Macgregor.



17 Koala conservation

\$220,000 in 2016-17 to support the Moggill Koala Hospital and the Daisy Hill Koala Centre to provide care and rehabilitation services to sick and injured koalas, as well as provide community education on koala conservation.

18 Step Up Step Down facility

\$4 million in 2016-17 out of a \$4.8 million total spend to provide an alternative to hospital admission and support the recovery of consumers with a mental health diagnosis at Nundah House.

Mining Equipment, Technology and Services Growth Centre

> \$6.4 million in 2016-17 out of a \$20 million total spend towards the new centre at the Queensland University of Technology in Brisbane. This initiative is in partnership with the Australian Government.

North Stradbroke Island Economic Transition Strategy

\$2.5 million in 2016-17 out of a \$20 million total spend to begin strategy implementation.

21 North Stradbroke recreation, visitor, management and access facilities

\$1.9 million in 2016-17 to deliver buildings and park infrastructure to support visitor recreation on Stradbroke Island.

22 Redland Bay Marina bus station

\$3.6 million in 2016-17 out of a \$7.4 million total spend to construct a bus station at Banana Street, due for completion in January 2017. Sandgate and Junction Road intersection upgrade

\$1.2 million in 2016-17 out of a \$6.9 million total spend to undertake improvements to the Junction Road/ Sandgate Road intersection, due for completion in September 2016.

24 Sexual health at Biala

\$3.1 million in 2016-17 out of a \$13.2 million total spend to reinvigorate the Biala Sexual Health Clinic in Roma Street, Brisbane.

25 SunWater upgrades

\$7.4 million in 2016-17 for investment in new plant and equipment and minor works.

26 West End State School

\$4.4 million in 2016-17 out of a \$10.5 million total spend to continue construction of additional classrooms and a resource centre.

27 World Science Festival 2017

\$1.5 million in 2016-17 for delivery of the World Science Festival 2017, an annual week-long celebration creating a fusion of science and art.

Wynnum Integrated Health Care Centre

\$12.7 million in 2016-17 out of a \$13.6 million total spend for the development and construction of the Wynnum Integrated Health Care Centre. The new centre will offer a centralised modern public health facility providing essential health services to the Wynnum community.

29 Ambulance station replacement at Wynnum

\$100,000 in 2016-17 out of a \$3.5 million total spend to replace the station. 30 New Farm State School

\$735,000 in 2016-17 out of a \$3.7 million total spend for additional classrooms.

31 Kelvin Grove State College

\$7.1 million in 2016-17 out of a \$7.8 million total spend for additional classrooms.

32 Queensland Art Gallery – Blockbuster Exhibitions

> \$3 million in 2016-17 out of a \$12.3 million total spend to secure blockbuster and major exhibitions.

33 Veloway 1, Pacific Motorway Cycleway

> \$5.4 million in 2016-17 out of a \$24.7 million total spend to construct a cycleway between O'Keefe Street and Lewisham Street as part of the Veloway 1 Pacific Motorway Cycleway.

North Brisbane Bikeway, Windsor to Wooloowin

\$3.6 million in 2016-17 out of a \$14 million total spend to construct cycleways between Somerset Street to Price Street as part of the North Brisbane Bikeway between Windsor and Wooloowin.

State Netball Centre

\$15 million in 2016-17 out of a \$30 million total spend to construct the centre.

36 Cultural Precinct Critical Infrastructure

\$11.1 million in 2016-17 out of a \$21.2 million total spend to renew and replace large critical infrastructure items across the precinct.
