#### Reforms to strengthen State Parliament's committee system approved

Reforms aimed at strengthening the Queensland Parliament's committee system were agreed to by State Parliament today.

Speaker John Mickel said the new parliamentary committee system would enhance the Parliament's scrutiny of proposed legislation and also government expenditure.

Seven new committees, each aligned to specific areas of government responsibility, will replace the previous committee system that has operated since 1994.

"These new portfolio-based committees will be better able to scrutinise actions proposed by the government of the day through their powers to examine Bills introduced into the Parliament as well as government expenditure," Mr Mickel said.

"The reforms will strengthen the Parliament's oversight of legislation and will also provide for greater government accountability."

Mr Mickel highlighted the historical importance of the changes to the Parliament's committee system.

"These rank highly among the most significant changes to the way the Parliament functions since the abolition of the Legislative Council in 1922," Mr Mickel said.

"Whereas there is still debate and controversy about what occurred with our Upper House 90 years ago, I am certain that there will be an overwhelmingly positive view among Queenslanders of today's reforms to the Parliament's committee system."

Mr Mickel outlined the powers of the new committees, which are contained in amendments to Standing Orders approved by the Parliament today.

"The new committee system is expected to enhance the process of public consultation on Bills that are before the House.

"The portfolio committees' examination of proposed legislation could involve calling for public submissions, holding hearings and engaging expert advice on Bills.

"A committee's examination of a Bill will result in a report back to the House which may recommend amendments to the Bill prior to its consideration in detail by the House," Mr Mickel said.

The reforms originate from a review of the parliamentary committee system by the Parliament's Committee System Review Committee, which reported in December last year.
