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Our approach

Infrastructure is vital in connecting our communities and the wider world, and underpins a productive economy. Providing and maintaining infrastructure in a state the size of Queensland with Australia's most decentralised population is a challenging task. It requires new and innovative thinking to meet growing demand at this time of fiscal restraint.

Integrated planning and a clear infrastructure pipeline

The Queensland Government has been very deliberate in our work to deliver better planning and better infrastructure. We believe a responsible approach with a credible pipeline of projects will give certainty to industry, investors and communities across the state.

Resilience and smarter use of existing infrastructure

While infrastructure helps drive economic and social development, it comes at significant cost. We must work together to identify where we can make better use of and improve existing infrastructure and find new ways to build capacity over time. We also need to increase the reliability and resilience of key infrastructure, to both improve productivity and lower costs and protect against natural disasters. Our government will continue work with partners to mitigate against future disasters and improve the operation of key supply chains.

Partnering with the private sector

Our government also recognises the significant role and potential of the private sector to deliver and operate infrastructure, and continues to seek partnerships to drive productivity and growth.

New technologies and innovation

We are intensifying our focus on ensuring digital infrastructure is in place to capitalise on global opportunities and will continue to build on existing successful models like Telehealth and Policelink that bring world-class services and immediate access to remote and regional communities. Information technology also allows us to make better use of existing



infrastructure assets and networks, while new mobile applications will allow users to make smarter journey planning choices.

Smart funding and financing

We have demonstrated our commitment to providing the strategic infrastructure needed to propel Queensland into the 21st century—whether it be the Toowoomba Second Range Crossing, the Bruce Highway Upgrade Program, Next Generation Rollingstock or the Government Wireless Network.

However, Queensland's current high levels of debt restrict our capacity to provide economic and social infrastructure. That is why, subject to a mandate from Queenslanders at the next state election, we propose to sell or lease some assets to allow us to implement the Strong Choices Investment Program to deliver the vital infrastructure that Queensland needs. It is also why we will look to new partnerships with the private sector to enhance the role they play in providing infrastructure services.

Accelerating action

We will focus on three key drivers in the short to medium-term to help achieve Queenslanders' 30-year vision for infrastructure:

- Infrastructure Q the infrastructure plan for a strong Queensland.
- Strong Choices Investment Program (subject to a mandate at the next state election).
- Innovating in the design, financing and management of infrastructure.

Delivering for Queenslanders

Queensland schools project

The Queensland Schools Project is an infrastructure and maintenance package of eight Prep to Year 6 primary schools and two Year 7 to 12 secondary schools in rapidly developing areas in South East Queensland (i.e. Brisbane, Gold Coast, Ipswich and the Moreton local government areas). The first schools will open for the 2015 academic school year, followed by further school openings in 2016 and 2017.

Advancing our schools maintenance

A \$300 million Queensland Government fund to ensure our children have access to the best school facilities and a safer environment in which to learn.
