In accordance with recommendation 12 of the Committee's report, the following table provides an update on Government's progress in implementing the supported recommendations. Due to the broader program of work currently being undertaken by the Department of Transport and Main Roads to enhance motorcycle safety this will be the final implementation update on the THLGC recommendations. Future reporting on the Department's activities relating to motorcycle safety will occur through TMR Annual Reports.
