I was pleased to announce the return of QantasLink's third air service to Blackall and Barcaldine. The Government and the Blackall-Tambo Regional Council are jointly funding a \$360,000 upgrade for Blackall Airport, which will enable it to cater for the 74-seat QantasLink Q400 aircraft.



Announcements

Three new coal projects proposed

More than 100 million extra tonnes of coal could be exported every year with \$25 billion worth of projects in the Galilee Basin under consideration by the State Government.

Premier Anna Bligh and Treasurer Andrew Fraser visited the area to the north of Alpha on their way to Community Cabinet, accompanied by Waratah Coal officials.

The Coordinator-General is conducting environment assessments into three projects: Galilee Coal, proposed by Waratah Coal; and Alpha Coal and Kevin's Corner, both proposed by Hancock Prospecting.

The projects could create up to 13,000 construction jobs and 4400 operational jobs.

Sandy Creek crossing reopened

The Sandy Creek crossing on the Cramsie-Muttaburra Road near Longreach is now open.

Main Roads Minister Craig Wallace, who inspected the \$1.3 million crossing during Community Cabinet, said the project would benefit motorists during the wet season.

Longreach Regional Council carried out the roadworks, which involved raising the crossing 1.3 metres above the existing level.

Resealing of Central Highlands roads

Work has started on an \$8 million program to reseal roads in the Central Highlands.

Roads to be resealed include: Capricorn Highway west of Gogango Range, Bluff; Gregory Highway between Clermont and Springsure; Dawson Highway between Moura and Springsure; Blackwater-Cooroorah Road; Orion 10 Chain Road; Baralba-Woorabinda Road; Peak Downs Highway (Myall Creek); and Anakie-Sapphire Road.

The roadworks are expected to be completed by 11 December 2009, weather permitting. Call Main Roads on 4983 8700 for more information.

Home support boost

Safe crossing for Tambo Teddies

New crossing signs have been erected outside the Tambo Teddies shop in Tambo.

Minister for Main Roads Craig Wallace said the signs, which were located outside the original Tambo Teddies shop several years ago, had been relocated in front of the new store in Arthur Street.

'The Tambo Teddies have become an iconic part of this town and I am pleased we are able to work with the Blackall/Tambo Regional Council to reunite the shop and the signs,' Minister Wallace said.

Q150 bridge names announced

As part of Queensland's 150th birthday celebrations, Minister for Main Roads Craig Wallace revealed the names of two bridges in the Central West.

The Cooper Creek Bridge, located 11.6 kilometres north east of Windorah, will retain its original name, in honour of the area's early history. Explorer Charles Sturt named the creek after Charles Cooper, the first Chief Justice of South Australia.

The Barcoo River Bridge, located 500 metres south of the Blackall CBD will be known as the Kargoolnah Bridge. Kargoolnah was the earliest government authority in the Blackall area. The name honours Indigenous ancestors as well as pioneering families.

Barcaldine and Blackall events secured

Two of the regions most popular events will receive a boost to their 2010 budgets through the Queensland Events Regional Development Program (QERDP).

Barcaldine's Tree of Knowledge Festival will receive \$29,000 and the Blackall Heartland Festival \$20,000 towards their 2010 events.

Treasurer Andrew Fraser said recipients commonly used the funding to employ staff, produce promotional material and websites, and hire infrastructure.

\$280,000 for Winton Neighbourhood Centre

Community Services Minister Karen Struthers announced funding of more than \$280,000 for the Winton Neighbourhood Centre.

In a report by Volunteering Australia, Winton was described as 'a safe place with friendly, resilient people'.

'Everyone needs somewhere to go and someone to turn to when times are tough. In Winton, they turn to the neighbourhood centre.' Minister Struthers said.

The centre provides counselling and support services, family therapy, homelessness and mental health services and educational opportunities for locals.

Tourism careers for Central West jobseekers

Seventy jobseekers and early school leavers from Queensland's Central West will soon have the skills to begin tourism careers, thanks to two Longreach-based employment projects.

The projects, funded by \$286,520 from the State Government's Skilling Queenslanders for Work initiative, are run by the Central Western Queensland Remote Area Planning and Development Board (RAPAD).

The Outback Tourism Up-skilling project is providing tourism training for 50 long-term unemployed and under-employed people.

The Tasting Tourism in the Outback project provides 20 students with various accredited training activities.

Meals on Wheels volunteers honoured

Minister for Disability Services Annastacia Palaszczuk presented certificates to past and present Longreach Meals on Wheels volunteers during Community Cabinet.

The State Government's Home and Community Care program supports Longreach Meals on Wheels with \$14,400 a year so that 6000 meals can be delivered to the frail aged and people with a disability.
