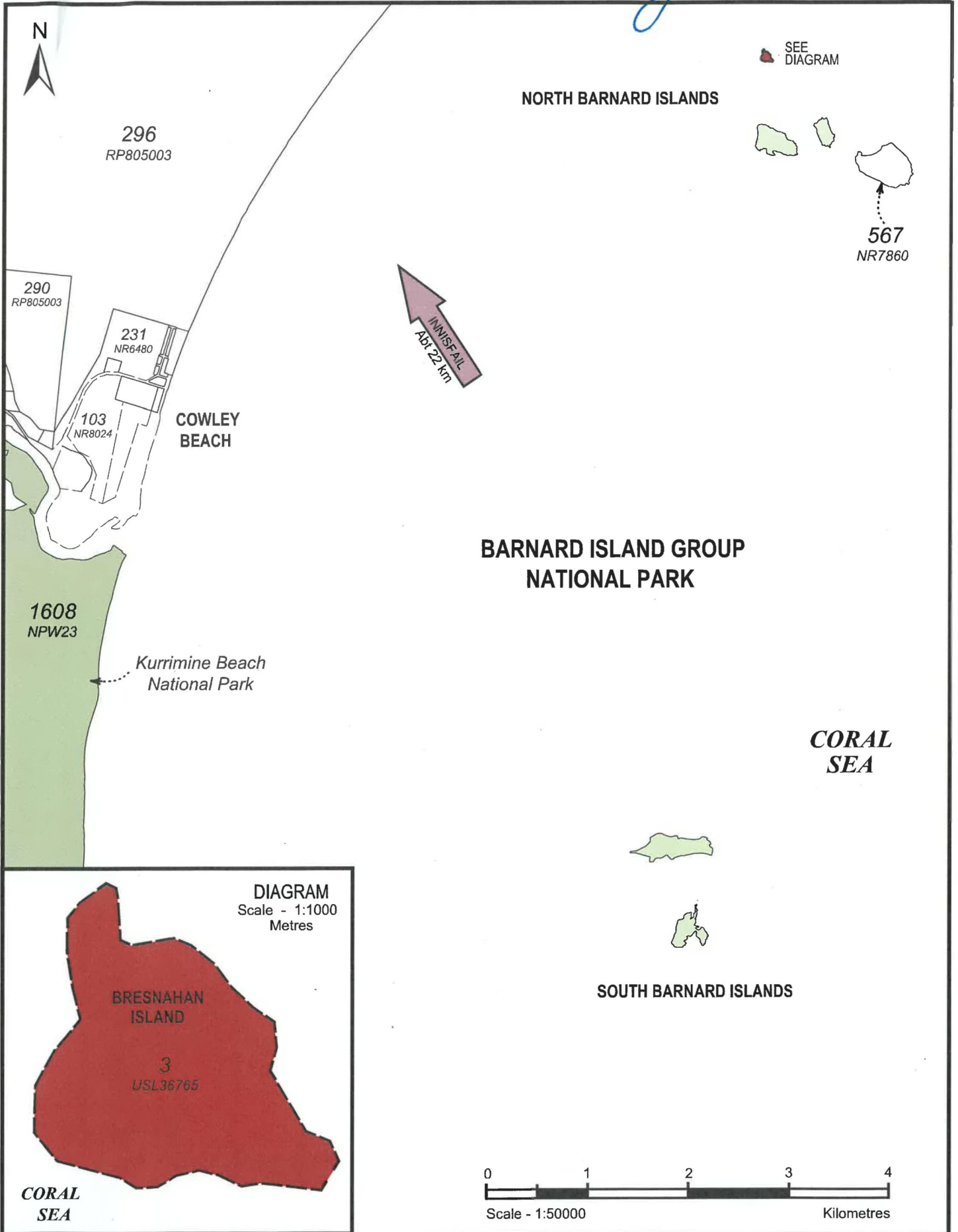

**A PROPOSAL UNDER THE *NATURE CONSERVATION ACT 1992* AND A
BRIEF EXPLANATION OF THE PROPOSAL**

- (A) A Proposal under section 32 of the *Nature Conservation Act 1992*, requesting the Governor in Council to make a regulation:
- (i) revoking the dedication of part of Barnard Island Group National Park, described as lot 3 on plan USL36765, containing an area of about 0.615 hectares, as illustrated on the attached "Barnard Island Group National Park_revocation Sketch".
- (B) A brief explanation of the Proposal.
- (i) Proposed revocation of the dedication of part of Barnard Island Group National Park, described as lot 3 on plan USL36765, containing an area of about 0.615 hectares, about 22 kilometres southeast of Innisfail. The proposal will revoke part of the national park, known as Bresnahan Island, to enable the reinstatement of its original tenure (unallocated State land) to facilitate the exercise of exclusive native title rights, interests and access by the Registered Native Title Body Corporate (Mamu Aboriginal Corporation RNTBC).
