I write in response to your letter regarding petition number 1921-12, tabled in Parliament on 1 November 2012, in relation to the mandatory fluoridation of water supplies in Queensland.

As some petitioners would be aware, the Government had proposed amendments to the Water Fluoridation Act 2008 to expand the grounds under which Local Governments could apply for an exemption from the requirement to fluoridate their drinking water supplies. The Government had also proposed to clarify which water supplies would be eligible to apply for an exemption.

On further consideration, the Government has decided to bring forward amendments to the Water Fluoridation Act that will see the removal from the Act of the mandatory obligation to implement fluoridation of drinking water supplies in Queensland.

These amendments will now ensure that the decision on whether to fluoridate a water supply can be made by Local Government; and it will be Local Government's obligation to determine what is 'in the best interests of the community' when deciding whether to fluoridate or not.

I note petitioners' concerns that water fluoridation may be deemed "mass medication". In Australia, the Therapeutic Goods Administration (TGA) for is responsible for regulating medicines to ensure their quality, safety and efficacy. The TGA does not require fluoride compounds to be registered as medicines if they are used for the prevention of tooth decay and are at concentrations below the level of 15 milligrams per kilogram as specified in the Standard for the Uniform Scheduling of Medicines and Poisons. In Queensland the concentration of fluoride in drinking water supplies, after fluoride dosing, ranges from 0.6 to 0.8 milligrams per litre. One litre of water weighs one kilogram, therefore this concentration places fluoridated drinking water well below the level at which fluoride would be classified as a medicine or poison.

I trust this information is of assistance to the petitioners.
