People of Parliament: Clerks at the Table

The Clerk of the Parliament makes sure that <u>parliament</u> (1) runs smoothly and effectively. The Clerk is Head of the entire Parliamentary Service and provides advice to the Speaker and <u>Members</u> <u>of Parliament</u> (2). This requires an excellent <u>knowledge</u> (3) of all parliamentary laws, procedures and <u>Standing</u> <u>Orders</u> (4), which are the rules of parliament. Unlike the Speaker, the Clerk is not an <u>elected</u> (5) Member of Parliament but a permanent public officer appointed to the role. There have only been 11 Clerks of the Parliament since <u>1860</u> (6).

The Clerk is responsible for the recording of all parliamentary proceedings, the distribution and tabling of Bills, notice papers, reports and <u>petitions</u> (7), and for making sure all the Parliament's documents are stored <u>safely</u> (8). When a Bill gets passed, before it goes to the Governor for Royal

Assent (9), the Clerk must certify its accuracy and <u>authenticity</u> (10).

The office of Clerk of the House began with the early <u>English</u> (11) Parliament. The earliest recorded appointment of a clerk to the <u>House</u> <u>of Commons</u> (12) was in 1363. Just like today, clerks at that time were responsible for ensuring that all procedures of Parliament were properly recorded. This obviously required the ability to <u>read</u> <u>and</u> <u>write</u> (13), which were not common skills in <u>14th</u> (14) century England.

The Clerk of the Parliament is supported by a team of clerks at the table. When Parliament sits, you will see two Clerks sitting at the <u>Table of the House</u> (15), directly in front of the Speaker. The Clerk sits on the <u>Speaker's</u> (16) right, on the <u>government</u> (17) side of the Chamber. The Deputy Clerk sits on the Speaker's <u>left</u> (18).
