All of the speeches delivered in Parliament are recorded (1). The name

given to these records of proceedings is Hansard. Hansard is the official transcript of all speeches, debates and proceedings of Queensland's Legislative Assembly. The term comes from the Hansard (2) family, which was granted permission to record the British parliamentary debates from (3) to 1889. Since then, the Hansard family name (4) has been used to refer to Records of Proceedings (5) in Westminster parliaments around the world. In colonial times, parliamentary proceedings were recorded by hand (6). Today, a team of Hansard reporters use special stenography (7) machines and digital audio <u>recordings</u> (8) to accurately report all <u>speeches</u> (9) and proceedings in Parliament. It takes years of training to become proficient and to keep up with parliamentary debate. These reporters (10), led by the Chief (11) Hansard Reporter, also record everything that is said in parliamentary committee hearings.
