STATEMENT OF RESERVATION

NON-GOVERNMENT MEMBERS ESTIMATES COMMITTEE G – LOCAL GOVERNMENT AND PLANNING

The Queensland Coalition objects to the proposal by the Minister for Local Government and Planning to deliver a decision relating to the rules under which elected councillors serve on their City, Town and Shire Councils.

The Minister for Local Government and Planning is using the position of Minister of the Crown to further the political objectives of the ALP rather than to benefit the wider community.

The report does not express my concern that the Minister for Communication, Information, Local Government, Planning, and Sport is clearly maneuvering to unfairly influence the outcome of the next State Election by requiring Local Government Councillors to resign before standing for the Queensland Legislative Assembly.

The Minister mislead the committee by asserting that he was being fair and stating "there are two people of whom I am aware – and there could be more – who are councillors endorsed by political parties to run at the next state election. I am aware of only two one is a Labor Party Councillor on the Townsville City Council. I do not think I would be accused of trying to do something corrupt against my own Party". The second is a National Party Candidate.

The Townsville Councillor referred to is an ALP Candidate endorsed to run in the Federal seat of Herbert and not in the State Election as the Minister stated. The clear motive is to discourage high profile independent council candidates running against sitting ALP members and to reduce the number and calibre of high profile conservative candidates when the ALP at the time of the hearing had no councillors endorsed to run at the next state election.

The proposed changes to the Electoral Arrangements are unnecessary they will discriminate against councillors and put them in a similar category of bankrupts and criminals who cannot stand for the Legislative Assembly. No other State in Australia has such conditions and no such requirement is imposed on public servants or ministerial advisors who wish to stand for State Parliament.
