Report to the Legislative Assembly

INTRODUCTION

Pursuant to Standing Order 167(3), the Legislative Assembly, by Order made on 1 May 2008, referred to Estimates Committee E for investigation and report certain proposed expenditures contained in the *Appropriation Bill 2008*. Organisational units within the portfolios of the following Ministers were allocated to Estimates Committee E:

- the Minister for Mines and Energy;
- the Attorney-General and Minister for Justice and Minister Assisting the Premier in Western Oueensland; and
- the Minister for Emergency Services.

The committee held public hearings on Tuesday, 22 July 2008. A transcript of the committee's hearings is available on the Queensland Parliament website at: http://www.parliament.qld.gov.aw/Hansard/.

Prior to the public hearing, the committee put 20 questions on notice to each Minister. Responses to all the questions were received on 21 July 2008.

The committee has considered the estimates referred to it by examining information contained in:

- the budget papers;
- answers to pre-hearing questions on notice;
- oral evidence taken at the hearing; and
- documents tabled at the hearing.

Answers to questions on notice, together with minutes of the committee's meetings, are included in a volume of additional information tabled with this report.

Highlights for the Department of Emergency Services in 2008-09 include: ⁵

- implementation of demand management strategies;
- employment of 250 additional ambulance officers;
- capital funding of \$29.3m towards building the Queensland Emergency Operations Centre;
- funding of \$16.9m for more than 145 new ambulances;
- funding of \$13.4m for 30 new or replacement urban fire and rescue appliances;
- commencement or completion of two new ambulance stations and 21 replacement or redeveloped ambulance facilities, and three new fire stations and 11 replacement or redeveloped firefighting facilities;
- service commencement in Cairns of a AgustaWestland 139 rescue helicopter;
- additional \$2.7m for helicopter services overhaul, safety staff, Townsville hangar leasing costs and

regional disaster management staff;

- funding of \$3.9m for the purchase of essential helicopter equipment;

STATEMENT OF RESERVATION

Dear Mr Moorhead,

I refer to the draft report for Estimates Committee E and submit a statement of reservations on the report and some general comments on the process of Estimates Committees hearings.

This year has once again shown major deficiencies in the Estimates Committee process that has limited the effective scrutiny of the expenditures of Government Departments and agencies. The following general reservations are held with regards to the Estimates Committee Process:

Regarding the portfolios scrutinised by the Committee, the following reservations are raised:

- The overall Estimates process has failed to allow for any real analysis of the expenditures detailed in the Queensland Budget Statements.
- The limited time available to scrutinise each of the portfolios and agencies outlined in session timetables fails to ensure adequate analysis of each portfolios expenditure.
- Reservations are held with regards to the limited number of Questions on Notice allowed for each portfolio, which limit the ability to examine in depth all areas of the allocated budget items.
- The failure of Estimates Committees to allow direct questioning of Senior Public Service administrators.
- Receiving responses to Questions on Notice less than 24 hours prior to the actual commencement of Committee hearings greatly inhibits the capacity to further research the completeness and accuracy of answers provided.
- In addition to limited time provided for questions, the avoidance tactics of Ministers who
 reply to questions in such a way as to evade the issue being scrutinised was a consistent
 theme throughout the hearings. Despite numerous follow up questions, Ministers either
 avoided answering questions or simply read prepared briefing notes on subjects not
 related to the Issues raised in the questions.
- The structured nature of the Committee proceedings into blocks of questions with set times from Government and Non-Government Members prevent Members being able to follow a line of questioning in a logical and consistent manner to finality.
- The integrity of the Estimates Committee process is grossly compromised due to amendments made to the Criminal Code Act 1899 (Qld) in June 2006, which abolished the crime of knowingly providing false evidence to the Legislative Assembly or a committee.

Regarding the specific examination of expenditure of public monies on the area of Mines and Energy, the following reservations are raised:

- The Minister for Mines and Energy failed to provide a clear answer to questions of how he set his \$3.5 billion coal royalty for 2008-09, a vital component for the Treasurer to claim his budget would be in surplus. We sought several times to elicit a clear and concise answer from Minister Wilson how he arrived at the budgeted higher coal royalty of \$3.5 billion for 2008-09 spiking from \$1.3bn in 2007-08. The Minister was either unable or unwilling to provide this information. We are concerned that the figure is not based on expected figures and has only been arrived at as a figure of what the Treasurer needed to balance the budget.
- We are also concerned Minister Wilson was unable to provide simple answers on why the Bligh government was refusing to pay the full 44 cents/kilowatt hour feed-in tariff for all solar power generated by Queensland households.
- In addition we are concerned by the level of Ergon's and Energex's distribution network that is more than 30 and 40 years-old. The Minister's answer to my question on notice is troubling given 65 per cent of Ergon's network at least 20 years-old and 38 per cent at least 30 years and older, Energex's network is a bit better, but still more than half is over 20 years-old and 31 per cent more than 30 years-old.

Overall we are concerned that the Minister's level of knowledge of his portfolio is substandard and he appeared less than prepared for the Estimates process. The Minister's responses to specific questions were met with only generalised responses about the importance of the industry and lacked the specificity the Opposition and the public would expect from a Minister.

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Attorney General and Justice-

With consideration complete for the Justice and Attorney General portfolio the following reservations are held –

- The budget papers are poorly broken down and do not allow for serious analytical consideration of expenditure in each of the areas.
- There is no budgetary break down for the 'Office of Fair Trading' in the budget papers.
- The Attorney General failed to answer questions on notice with regards to the number of matters coming through the children's court instead using a wait and see response.
- The number of budgetary performance measures that have been discontinued.
- The extraordinary amount of court case back logs in both civil and criminal matters.
- The failure to provide for increased staffing in the courts system as reported in the budget papers.
- No increase in judicial officers for the 2008/09 financial year.
- Three hours was grossly inadequate to examine 8 different portfolio areas budget expenditure.
- The Minister avoided answering questions during the committee stage that related to his
 conversations with CMC chairperson Robert Needham, specifically about Telephone
 Interception powers.
- The lack of staff in the ODPP will be compounded further when staff are taken off day to day matters to work on high profile cases, such as Patel and Nuttall.
- The 11th hour announcement by the premier regarding additional funding to the ODPP was not broken down adequately explained and needed to be to allow for adequate analysis during the committee process.
- There appears to be an inconsistency in reporting the budget for the Courts Innovation Program (CIP). In response to government question on notice 3 the Attorney claims that CIP has a budget of \$8.755 million in 2008/09, yet response to non government question on notice 1, the budget allocation for CIP is only \$2.858 million.
- The Attorney General refused to provide details of a letter sent to the ODPP by the Director of Legal Aid. This letter contained concerns legal aid had regarding the cape court circuit.
